# A&M Accepts Murano's Resignation

## Elsa Murano Announced Resignation On Sunday

COLLEGE STATION, Texas -- Texas A&M University accepted the abrupt resignation of embattled President Elsa Murano, who may have decided her own future before A&M System regents chose it for her.

Just 17 months after being celebrated as a historic choice to lead the 48,000-student campus, Murano resigned Sunday ahead of a special meeting Monday called by the university's governing board.

Texas A&M Vice President Bowen Loftin will serve as the university's interim president. The board expects to name a permanent replacement in about six months.

Murano, 49, was the first Hispanic and first female president in the 132-year history of Texas A&M, which didn't admit women on an equal basis until 1971. She departed less than two weeks after the release of a scathing internal performance review blemished by low marks for leadership and management.

She will remain on the faculty as a full professor following a one-year leave of absence.

Murano will receive her presidential salary of \$425,000 during the leave of absence. She will receive an annual salary of \$260,000 when she returns as professor.

"We're pleased that her skills and talents will continue to serve the university and the students in the years to come," said Morris Foster, chairman of the Texas A&M Board of Regents. "We agreed to her transition back into the faculty of college agriculture and life science."

Gov. Rick Perry, an A&M alumnus who appointed all nine A&M system regents, said Monday it remains to be seen whether Murano's departure is good for the university.

Perry expressed confidence in the regents and their decision-making.

"Best I can tell, I saw her perform in an acceptable way," Perry said.

Murano was not giving interviews Monday, said her spokesman, Erin Powers.

Murano's attorney, Darryl Carter, released the following statement.

"Dr. Murano was committed to a quick and constructive resolution of this matter. The transition agreement reflects our recognition of the intentions of the Chancellor and the Board of Regents. The agreement also recognizes Dr. Murano's exemplary service and continuing commitment to Texas A&M. She remains grateful for the expressions of support and loyalty that she has received from faculty, staff, current and former students, and friends of the University."

About 50 faculty members and students, some wearing black armbands, protested in support of Murano on A&M's mostly deserted campus before the regents convened. One student carried a sign that had Texas A&M's famous "Gig 'Em" thumbs up image turned upside-down.

Bob Bednarz, speaker of the A&M faculty senate, said Murano came a long way from a skeptical choice who wasn't among a search committee's three finalists to winning approval throughout campus.

"One of the frustrating things about this situation is that there is no information," Bednarz said. "We generally do not know how decisions are made, or why the regents or the chancellor makes those decisions."

The board of regents had announced the special meeting Friday, and had scheduled to discuss the university's leadership in what had every appearance of a decision on Murano's future.

In a statement Sunday, Murano said recent weeks had been "taxing" for the university and thanked those who offered messages of support.

"Our university is strong and I know that we will weather this storm," Murano said. "I sincerely hope and pray that we will intensify our efforts to protect and enhance Texas A&M's reputation. I trust that the important issues raised in recent weeks will be addressed in the Aggie way with integrity, selfless service and indomitable spirit."

Texas A&M University System Chancellor Mike McKinney conducted Murano's review, which was dated Feb. 9. In her first full year on the job, Murano got the lowest marks possible when it came

to follow through, acting decisively and timely, and being a team player.

Murano disputed the poor review in a 10-page response sent March 10 to the chancellor and regents.

"Given the complete disconnection between Dr. McKinney's perception of my performance as president and all the evidence to the contrary, I can conclude that this review was not based on facts," Murano wrote.

Born in Cuba before fleeing with her family in the early 1960s, Murano first joined the A&M faculty in 1995 and rose to become dean of the university's agricultural school. She was also appointed to serve as undersecretary for food safety at the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Murano succeeded Robert Gates, who left to become U.S. secretary of defense. In announcing her resignation, Murano said she hoped to return to the faculty.
